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From the Director

As I write this, a group of excited children are learning about bees and their societies downstairs, pretending to be workers gathering nectar and attending to their queen to the music of "Flight of the Bumblebee". Others are out fishing for invertebrates in the ponds, or making the "Big Hike" out to the "Big Tree". Outside, the osprey chicks have fledged and are slowly learning to fend for themselves, although Mom and Dad are still bringing fish to the nest. All around are the sounds of nature, and people learning about nature. That's how we roll, and it's wonderful to be here on these days.

It's also wonderful that our place has a sense of endurance. This fall, November 18 to be exact, Woodland Dunes will be 40 years old. What started as Bernie's dream has seen 40 years, 1,300 acres protected, and 100,000 children taught. We should all be proud of what we have done together as an organization.

Our summer education program has been busier than ever, thanks to the hard work of Jessica and our interns, Kayla, Rose, Nick and Connor. Our other intern, Rachel, also helps with many tasks around the Nature Center, such as feeding the indoor animals and cleaning after a busy day with education programs. We thank them all for their excellent work, tremendous attitude and wish them well as they go back to college. They have been outstanding additions to our staff, and we will truly miss them. We are grateful to Silver Lake College, Nancy Horvath and the Hooper Foundation, as well as the Wisconsin Association for Independent Colleges and Universities (through a grant from the West Foundation), for making it possible for us to hire these outstanding young people to work with us.

Through the Restore the Shore project, we planted more than 2,000 trees and shrubs this spring and summer, and tended to their needs. We are working with several surrounding landowners including the City of Two Rivers to restore habitat, and we're anxious to watch our sites develop. If you travel down Columbus St., you'll see our plantings at Zander Park, in the field north of 12th St., and on Memorial Drive at the Rotary Garden wayside. We're also improving part of our preserve just north of the Aurora Medical Center with the removal of old buildings and planting of about 1,000 bird-friendly trees and shrubs. This property is very close to the lake and is already excellent for birding. These plantings will make it even better.

Just north of that site is a parcel that will see the development of a new wetland, thanks to the assistance of Wisconsin Public Service. This will be the largest wetland restoration we have attempted, and will involve the re-grading of much of this old agricultural field, which is now drained by a ditch. The result will be a large wet meadow/sedge meadow with a stream meandering through. This will provide a better habitat for both birds and even some spawning habitat for fish that travel up the ditch from Lake Michigan. We plan to begin work this fall, after birds are done nesting for the year.

Our nature center will see the construction of a new bird observation area in the Edna Smith room, thanks to a donation from the Alyea family. The plans for this project are being drawn at this time and are expected to be carried out this fall.

In our preserve, we are increasingly concerned about the emerald ash borer and the impact it will have on our forest, especially the seasonally flooded swales. We are seeking funding for a project that will involve planting several species of native trees with the intent of increasing diversity in the forest in case the Asian insects kill our green and black ash, which seems likely at this point.

There will be some changes to our fall school programs and our migration season bird banding that will insure that Jessica and I have plenty to do this season! We are grateful for the help from our wonderful volunteers who make these and all our programs possible.

Our nest will soon be empty! Through generous support from the Hooper Foundation, Wisconsin Association for Independent Colleges and Universities and Silver Lake College, we were fortunate enough to have four college interns join us for the summer. Their help was invaluable and allowed us to further our mission.

With their help, we were able to:

- *Remove invasive plant species from 4 acres of the preserve
- *Plant and care for 2,000 native trees and shrubs
- *Provide 150 hours of Clean Boats Clean Waters education at local boat launches
- *Educate more than 550 children about the environment
- *Keep our trails and grounds maintained
- *Create education materials
- *Build a kid-sized brush pile for our fall education program

Program Update

We are wrapping up our first season of invasive species removal and tree planting for our Restore the Shore project. We have a little under one thousand trees left to plant this fall, and invasive species work is always ongoing (except in the depths of winter). We will be starting work on some Japanese knotweed and Phragmites removal along the West Twin River and East Twin River as part of a few grants we received. This will not only protect the Woodland Dunes preserve from invasion by these species, but also benefit the watershed and our community.

Our Barberrryan work days will continue into the fall as well. Once all the remaining trees are planted, we will shift our focus to removing as much invasive species as possible before the snow flies. The efforts of all of our volunteers are greatly appreciated, and immediate results can be seen both in the brush piles of cut down invasives, and in the numerous white tree tubes protecting our newly planted natives. This exciting project will also yield even greater birding opportunities, right in the city.

On Saturday, September 13 we will be participating in the first ever state-wide Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) Bridge Snapshot Day. Training will be provided in the morning and volunteers will go out to pre-determined sites on the West Twin River and East Twin River to look for invasive species and then return to Woodland Dunes Nature Center to report their findings.
