Ice Age Trail:

Woodland Dunes Segment 2.25 miles

This segment of the Ice Age Trail runs through Woodland Dunes Preserve and is concurrent with Trillium Trail for part of its length. It is marked by yellow blazes. Unlike other Woodland Dunes Trails, the Ice Age Trail is open to dogs on leashes, but they must stay on the trail.

Goodwin Road Trails:

Black Cherry Trail 0.8 miles Trillium Trail 1.5 miles

These wooded walks through the ridges and swales of an anciet lake pass through upland mixed hardwoods and a wooded swamp. Amphibians, birds, and Canadian carpet plants can be seen in summer. Bridges cross seasonally wet swales.


Yellow Birch Trail 0.3 miles

A boardwalk through a forest and a hardwood swamp, where many unusual birds, amphibians, and plants can be seen.

Coneflower Trail 0.74 miles

Circle through Woodland Dunes' prairie planting and learn about prairie plants, listen to grassland bird songs, and enjoy the changes from one season to the next. Informative signs and demonstration plot with typical prairie plants identified.

Trail Etiquette

Stay on the trail—Our forest floor and wetlands support many species of birds, animals and plants. If you venture off the path you may be harming a precious environment.

No pets—Domesticated animals can be very harmful to the wildlife and plants established in our natural area. An exception is the Ice Age Trail, where pets on a leash are allowed.

No bicycles, snowmobiles or other vehicles—Our trails are designed for the enjoyment of their unique natural surroundings. Slow down and take the time to observe the beauty of nature.

No smoking—Did you know that cigarette filters can be harmful to animals and birds?

Columbus Street Trail:

Conifer Trail 0.5 miles

Walk through a mixed hardwood-conifer forest, follwing ridges and crossing a swale. Signs identify trees.

Nature Center Trails:

Harold Alyea Tower:

Get a bird's eye view of the wetlands from this 30-foot tower located next to the Nature Center. This two-story tower overlooks the West Twin River and has a viewing scope on the second story.

Cattail Trail 0.3 miles

A boardwalk through a shrub swamp, a sedge meadow, and a cattail marsh. Birds and wetland animals abound. Informative signs.

Willow Trail 0.9 miles

Wind though a tall shrub carr ahabitat that opens to a broad meadow and restored prairie. Take the *Goldenrod Loop* around Todd's pond and enjoy the pleasant setting. Continue through another shrub swamp, then wander along past a cattail marsh and meadows. Take the *Horsetail Loop* to see Manitowoc County's largest tree, a cottonwood. Rejoin Willow Trail and continue to the West Twin River, where wetland animals and habitat can be seen.
